Encountering the Word

LESSON

Reader: Mary Masi-Phelps Mark 9:2-9, *NRSV*

Without the cross, resurrection is meaningless. And without both the crucifixion and resurrection, the identity of Jesus is incomplete. This scene at the center of Mark's telling of the good news follows (1) the revelation of Jesus as the Messiah, (2) Jesus' prediction of his suffering death and (3) the disciples' denial that the Messiah will suffer. Jesus' transfiguration is thus a foreshadowing or a glimpse of resurrection glory before moving into the story of Jesus' passion and death.

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them anymore, but only Jesus.

As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.
